KEY LARGO EMS FUNDING

- KLVAC is a non-profit 501.c.3 Corporation.
- KLVAC is funded by taxes budgeted via the Key Largo Fire &EMS District, revenue generated from "billing patients for transport services" and thru donations.

History of the Department:

- 1955 .. "Band-Aid Brigade" formed by the Ladies Auxiliary of the Key Largo Volunteer Fire . Department.
- 1971 .. Key Largo Volunteer Ambulance Corps. Incorporates.
- 1972 .. KLVAC becomes the first Volunteer Corps in the state to be granted an ALS license.
- 1974 .. The Corps. Moves into their new building (built by volunteers and members of the community with money from donations).
- 1980 \dots The last check is written to pay off the mortgage on our new building.
- 1991 .. KLVAC becomes a hybrid system with paid paramedics & Volunteer EMTs/First . Responders.
- 2004 .. New Crew quarters and ambulance bays are built on the north end of the station. (with money from transfers & donations from the community).
- 2005 .. Monroe County gives KLVAC the deed to the land that our building sits on.

The Key Largo Fire Rescue & Emergency Medical Services District was born on June 8, 2005 when Governor Bush approved Florida Statute 2005-329 that created the 68th Special Taxing District in the State of Florida.

Today Key Largo Vol. Ambulance Corps is an ALS service with 4 rescues, 2 of which run 24/7. Current membership is approximately 40 paramedics, EMTs, first responders.

KLVAC is also a satellite campus for FKCC and EEII, Training first responders, EMTs, and paramedics. CPR and first aid are also taught to the community



Challenges


- It was a difficult year when it came to maintaining the vehicles. Several recalls and unexpected repairs made it a challenge to keep our fleet operational.

 adequately staff the vehicles.

Training

- Training from outside instructors that teach specialties from other departments (MCSO,KLFR, U of M,)
- We have purchased new training equipment to provide more hands on life-like training for the members








This is to show how we compare to other agencies per Florida Department of Health.


Monthly calls and back-up calls total







AEDs

- KLVAC has a community AED program run by Corps members, Brenda Beckmann, Tess Marra, Kenny Edge, George Mirabella
- The special committee is responsible for the distribution of AEDs in key location throughout the community...
- AEDs are in the process of having the batteries replaced this year.
- Location of AEDs placed in the community:
 - o Pennekamp State Park 1
 - o Captain Slate Dive Center 1
 - o Jacob Aquatic Center 1
 - Monroe County Murray Nelson Building 2
 - o Fish & Wildlife 3
 - o Key Largo Volunteer Fire Department 3
- Also assist in private business owners in obtaining at a discounted cost/rate thru KLEMS AEDs
- Still have four AEDs in station

Achievements

- Our third Donation Request letter was a success thanks to generous support from the community.
- Received our second grant for two Stryker "Pro-Lifts" which are designed to help load the stretcher into the ambulance. This significantly reduces the potential for back injuries. Now all four of our trucks have Pro-Lifts in them.
- The Organizational Chart was modified to include a Logistics Captain, a
 Deputy Chief of Administration and a Deputy Chief of Operations.
- Key Largo Volunteer Ambulance Corps changed its Articles of Incorporation to allow the Corps to provide fire suppression and fire prevention.
- Key Largo EMS restructured and created a second Corporation, the Key Largo Volunteer Fire Department, which now provides fire protection to Key Largo. This was done at the request of the KL Fire & EMS District and it allowed us to retain the quality personnel that were already providing fire service in Key Largo.
- Maintained a high retention level for our organization; only one part-time paid medic left (hired by Palm Beach Fire) and gained four new volunteers.

Future of the Department

• This past year KLVAC has made a fair amount of changes, including updating our Bylaws, implementing a new evaluation process for bring on new personnel, and overall building in accountability throughout the organization. We will be reviewing our SOP's this coming year. This will allow our organization to pave the way to the future, which ultimately helps us provide excellent patient care and improve community involvement. We hope to obtain more grants to help move this organization forward. Having State-of-the-Art equipment, vehicles and high quality personnel; KLVAC is setting its sights higher for years to come.
