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#### **INTRODUCTION**

Key Largo Volunteer Fire Rescue Department, Inc. is a 50 volunteer member, combination fire department that also employs 3 full time firefighters; 4 part-time firefighters; and 1 station manager. The Department provides 24 hour a day fire rescue services to the residents of Key Largo, an island community of approximately 11,000 yearly residents and operates out of two fire stations. During the season and on weekends and holidays that population increases dramatically with an influx of tourists and "snow-bird" retirees. Visitation in Key Largo is estimated at over 4 million visitors per year. Visitation is year-round due to the subtropical climate of the area and the lure of world class fishing and diving due to the proximity to the largest living coral reef in the U.S. located in nearby Biscayne National Park, it's crystal clear protected waters, largest manmade reef - sunken U.S.S. Spiegel Grove, numerous shipwrecks, and its and exotic natural and relaxed atmosphere.

Key Largo is the first key or island of a string of islands off of the southernmost tip of Florida that stretch for 100 linear miles from Key Largo to Key West that make up the Florida Keys, Monroe County, Florida. The population of Monroe County is approximately 73,000 with a visitation count of over 4 million. The island of Key Largo is approximately 27 miles long and consists of approximately 22,000 acres. Key Largo Fire Rescue's jurisdiction extends to the near shore waters of the Florida Bay and the Atlantic Ocean and a number of small islands in those waters as well as numerous canals and marinas that are all bordered by resort, residential and boating communities. Homes in the area consist of mobile homes and trailers. live-aboard boats/vessels, homes built prior to

quality construction codes, and fully codcompliant homes.

Key Largo has a seasonal tropical storm and hurricane season as well as a dry/fire season.

KLVFD operates as the incident command center and emergency operations center and shelter during tropical storms and hurricanes as well as for any hazardous or radiological emergencies that might occur as a result of an accident from the nearby Turkey Point Nuclear Power Plant. To be equipped with the ability to respond to any and all emergencies or activities that might occur during these times via land and sea is imperative.

The responsibility for fire, rescue, and EMS services in the Key Largo district falls under the Key Largo Fire Rescue and EMS Special Independent District formed in 2006. The District has the authority to levy and collect ad valorem taxes for fire, rescue and EMS services from the taxpayers of Key Largo. The District has a 5 member Board of Commissioners that operates in the Sunshine and oversees the budget and administration of the Key Largo District.

#### **LEGAL DESCRIPTON**

Monroe County Ordinance 035-1996 states the boundaries for District 6:

That part of Key Largo from South Bay Harbor Drive and Lobster Lane to the southern boundary of the intersection of the right-of-way County roads 905 and 905A, plus Cross Key.

visitation to Key Largo is year-round with the heaviest influx during snow bird season (November through April) and Spring Break Season (March through May). Weekend visitation is extremely high. The local Chamber of Commerce estimates that the annual visitation can easily exceed 4 million per year. Many of these visitors spend their time in our various households/homes in the Keys.

#### Challenges/Vulnerabilities

Key Largo residents and visitors reside in a variety of different types of homes. Key Largo has 7 trailer communities with approximately 2,800 residents (U.S. 2010 CENSUS); marinas that house live-aboard vessels (approximately 5 communities, with approximately 55 boats and 80-90 residents); and homes that were constructed prior to the development of quality building codes and "grandfathered" so that they are not required to meet current quality building and fire codes. The vulnerability for fire hazards to exist in these environments is great.

Visitation has doubled in the past 2 years accordingly to recent tourism figures.

Approximately 89 percent of visitors whether it be visiting and staying in Key Largo or passing through Key Largo do so via automobile. This would account for the large percentage/number of annual motor vehicle accidents.

#### **RESPONSE - INCIDENT STATISTICS**

#### EMERGENCY INCIDENT/CALL VOLUME 2011 & 2012

**2011** Our **total emergency call volume** for all incidents was **471**. (Attach. #2)

**Total fire related incidents for 2011** were **55** incidents, or 11.7 percent of the total call volume (471). *(Attach. #3)* 

In 2012 our total emergency call volume was 482 incidents. (Attach. #2)

**Total fire related incidents for 2012** were **36**, or 7.65 percent of the total call volume (471). (Attach. #3)

Motor Vehicle accidents (95) including vehicle extrication rescues (19) totaled 114 and comprised 24.24 percent of our total call volume in 2011 (471). (Attach. #4)

In **2012 MVA's** (117) including extrication rescues (6) totaled **123** or 25.5 percent of total calls (482). (Attach. #4.1)

The Department provided mutual aid to neighboring fire Departments 10 times in 2011 and 9 times in 2012. (Attach. #5)

The number of incidents where we provided **EMS or Medical assistance** totaled **102** or 21.66 percent of the total call volume in **2011** (471). (Attach. #5)

The number of incidents where we provided **EMS or Medical assistance** in **2012** totaled **101** or 22.17 percent of total call volume (482). (Attach. #5)

#### **EMERGENCY INCIDENT RESPONSE 2011 & 2012**

Average Attendance at NFIRS (total) incidents (471) in 2011 was 6.14 with 16 being the highest in attendance. (Attach. #6 and 6.1)

Average Attendance at NFIRS (total) incidents (482) in 2012 was 5.13 with 13 being the highest in attendance. (Attach. #7 and 7.1)

The department has made a concerted effort with the support of the Key Largo Fire Rescue and EMS District to improve our service and ultimately our ISO rating through the installation of new hydrants, improvement in staffing levels, water supply, training, equipment, and many other components that are considered when an ISO review is conducted. The department currently has 119 hydrants in the District. Our firefighters conduct quarterly inspections of these hydrants and the District budgets for the Florida Aqueduct Authority to conduct a full annual inspection and maintenance program on all hydrants.

#### **FIRE PREVENTION**

as far as Key Largo Firefighters are concerned. The best way to support our Community and provide the highest level of fire rescue services is to continually educate the public on what they can do to PREVENT fires, accidents and injuries due to emergency related incidents. We also continually strive to educate OURSELVES in the latest fire and rescue techniques and strive to ensure that our neighborhoods, businesses, marinas, schools, etc. are the recipients of pre-fire planning and inspection. Education, training and preparation are essential in ensuring that this happens.

We continually like to encourage residents, schools, and businesses to contact us for a free pre-incident inspection and fire prevention session. We regularly conduct pre-fire planning of our local businesses so that we know the layout of the property, where the necessary water sources and hook-ups are located, the type of emergency warning and sprinkler systems they have and where the control panels are located, entrance and egress to the

properties, etc. so that we can provide the most efficient and highest quality service in time of need.

We regularly schedule fire prevention education and activities at the local pre-schools and elementary schools during fire prevention week as well as throughout the year as requested.

#### WATER EMERGENCY TEAM

The community boasts the first and largest man-made reef in the Florida Keys with



the sinking of the Spiegel Grove 3 miles off the shores of Key Largo in the Atlantic Ocean. Divers from around the world come to visit the area.

Key Largo is home to one of the most elite special response teams - the Water Emergency Team (WET) which is comprised of local men and women, most of which hold the certification of dive master and rescue diver and work for the local dive business in Key Largo while volunteering their services to the community.

The delivery of a new dive rescue truck occurred in 2011. This vehicle is outfitted with state-of-the art dive rescue equipment and serves as a command center for not only dive rescue incidents but other incidents as needed.

Water emergency related incidents in 2011 totaled 7 or 1.5 percent of the total call volume (471).

Water emergency related incidents in 2012 totaled 7 or 1.46 percent of the total call volume (482).

The water emergency team supports not only Key Largo, but all of Monroe County.

the firefighters and emergency responders of today and the future so they in turn can provide the highest level of service to the residents and visitors of our Island Paradise.

#### **TRAINING**

Our Commitment to training continues. The Department boasts 5 state certified fire instructors. In addition to daily training drills with on-duty shift personnel the department conducts training on Thursday evenings. Additionally, a focus in 2011 and 2012 has been on ensuring all personnel are educated in NIMS, Mayday training, and E.V.O.C. Annual advanced extrication, high angle rescue and pump operations state certified courses were held as well.

#### **UPPER KEYS HONOR GUARD**



Key Largo Volunteers organized the first Upper Keys Honor Guard consisting of Firefighters from the Upper Keys, Key Largo, Tavernier and Islamorada Fire Departments. The Honor Guard is led by its Captain, Scott Desquotte, a volunteer firefighter with our Department.

The members of the Honor Guard regularly train and compete and dedicate their services to their local communities as well as other Departments throughout Florida and the Nation. They are involved in awards banquets, memorial services, local charitable events, conferences, and fund raising activities such, in 2012, the Fourth of July Florida Honor Guards in Paradise. We hosted a Fourth of July Parade and celebration with honor guards and pipe and drummers from all over the world.

Our Honor Guard participated in a similar event on St. Patrick's Day in Port St. Lucie in 2011.

We were saddened by the loss of one of our past Fire Chiefs, Howard Hinton. We held a ceremony in honor of Chief Hinton that involved funeral ceremony by our Honor Guard.

We were also extremely saddened to lose one of our founding fathers, firefighters and longtime Corporate President, Chris Fleming. Full funeral service and procession were held with full Honor Guard presence.

#### **501c3 DONATION DRIVE**

The continued service and dedication of our approximately 50 volunteer and paid firefighters has had a significant impact on our District's ability to keep the taxes in Key Largo the lowest in unincorporated Monroe County.

We could not do it without support from our residents and business owners, however. We send out an annual donation letter and are grateful for the continued support the donations from our community. Contributions to the Fire Department are tax deductible. Key Largo Volunteer Fire Rescue Department is a non-profit 501c3 organization.

Our doors are always open to the public. We welcome requests for information, assistance and participation in local events, and of course we welcome anyone interested in volunteering.

#### **RETENTION AND RECRUITMENT**

The Department welcomed 10 new firefighters in 2011 and 6 in 2012. All of our applicants come to us as fully state certified Firefighter II's and usually have their National EMT and/or Paramedic certification as well.

### HISTORY OF THE KEY LARGO VOLUNTEER FIRE/RESCUE DEPARTMENT

In 1954, the Tavernier Fire Department gave an older Fire Truck to the Key Largo area. This vehicle was kept at the Standard Oil Station at MM 99 Bayside where the Honda Dealership is now located.

A World War II Air Raid Siren was installed nearby as a "Call to Duty" alarm. Telephone back-up calls alerted other volunteer fire fighters, who were out of the range of the siren, to respond.

At that time, the area of Key Largo outside of the business district at MM 99 to 100 was mostly a wooded, rural area, so containing a fire was what the early fire fighters did. The occasional Fish Camp building or weekend trailer usually was "lost", but any adjacent or neighboring buildings were saved. A lot of the fires were allowed to burn out and only the power poles were "wetted down".

The First Ten Years: 1955-1965

The Key Largo area began to grow quickly and soon developers were clearing land and digging canals. A more organized Fire Department was needed to service this growth.

The organization of the Key Largo Volunteer Fire Department began early in 1955. Temporary officers of the Department, President Earl Antrim and Secretary Jack Lieb, served until formal elections were held.

By the fall of 1955, a newer, used Fire Truck was acquired and a building site in the Sunset Cove subdivision was given to the Department. These transactions needed a legal entity, so the Key Largo Volunteer Fire Department was incorporated and officially chartered by the State of Florida on December 7, 1955.

The volunteers built the Firehouse and for the most part, the local businessmen in the area paid for the construction materials.

The Official Roster in 1956 was:

Earl Antrim, Ralph Smith,

Jack Lieb, Paul Bridgham, Charlie Kreiter, Frank Taylor, and William Winston.

Willing hands eager to help out backed up these Official Members. Also the wives of the official members formed the Ladies Auxiliary and were always there with refreshments.

Charlie Kreiter was one of the first operational Fire Chiefs. He and a couple of others had Navy Firefighting experience in World War II.

In 1960, Hurricane Donna was devastating to Key Largo. The Firehouse stood the test, but membership was hit hard. Many businesses went broke and developers pulled out.

Monroe County purchased six new Ford Howe 750 gpm Fire Trucks with a Federal Reconstruction Grant and gave one each to Key Largo, Tavernier, Islamorada, Conch Key, Marathon, and Big Pine. The Key Largo Fire Department finally had a dependable Fire Truck.

Reconstruction was going on and workers coming into the area were joining the Fire Department, so membership was going up. The area was recovering.

New projects were improving the Key Largo area for tourism: 1. Pennekamp Park Headquarters was being built. 2. The "cut" between Blackwater Sound and Largo Sound had been completed. 3. The landing strip for light air craft was started at Port Largo.

4. Electric Power and water supply had greatly improved.

The Second Ten Years: 1965 - 1975

Radios were now in all trucks. Plectron Paging System had been installed. Our coverage area was changing by leaps and bounds.

Training became an important part of the Department. Aside from the weekly "drills", we had instructors from the State Fire College come each January or February to teach and certify our new members. The course was scheduled five nights for three hours each. Then on Saturday night, the Department would put on a big Lobster and Fish Dinner as a reward. Those dinners were the forerunners of the Annual Installation Banquets held today.

The State discontinued this training service to the volunteers in the early '70s. Funding, necessary for upgrade of trucks, equipment, and supplies became critical. We decided to send an annual Fund Drive Letter to all postal patrons for donations. Bar-B-Qs and Raffles were also used to raise needed funds.

During the late '69 to '71 era, building in the Keys was getting out of hand. A grass roots effort was started: "No More High Rises". The County implemented a building code and enforcement.

The Department's ladders were far too short for rescue or access to rooftops, so a 55 ft. TeleSquirt Pumper/Ladder truck was ordered from American La France. Delivery was scheduled for late 1973 or early 1974. In order to accommodate the new truck, an addition had to be built on the Key Largo Firehouse. This was done without any help from the County.

That period of time brought many challenges to the Fire Department. The U.S. 1 Highway from MM 106 to Tavernier Creek was being four-laned. Accidents were on the increase. There were five 18 wheel gasoline tankers overturned on the highway during that period. The Department got very proficient at "foaming down" the accidents and containing the fuel spills.

Thanks to weekend training sessions at Homestead Air Force Base, the Department developed an "evolution" to respond and control the scene that is still in use at accidents today.

In 1973, the need for a quick response Rescue Vehicle was determined. The Department bought the vehicle at a Fire Equipment Show in Miami right off the floor for \$22,000. Five people within our district had been approached and each responded with \$5000, payable by "drawing" within five years.

Ocean Reef developers were building a Private Club at the north end of Key Largo. Until they were able to establish a fire department, the Key Largo Volunteer Fire Department covered that area. The Missile Base on State Road 905 was also covered by Key Largo. At that time, plans were on the table for a massive development in North Key Largo at Port Bougainvillea. The need for a north end Key Largo Fire

Station was growing quickly. Two new 1250 gpm Pumpers were ordered from American La France. The North Station of the Key Largo Fire Department was erected in 1974, just in time for the new trucks. Actually the North Station was just a "barn", an old steel air plane hangar taken down from Ocean Reef.



The Third Ten Years: 1975 - 1985

The growth and development of the Keys continued to define the needs of the Key Largo Volunteer Fire/Rescue Department. The first set of "Jaws of Life" was purchased.

The replacement of the old Howe Pumper and the TeleSquirt trucks happened early in the 1980s.

A new Quick-Attack Rescue Truck was purchased.

Due to the close proximity of the Turkey Point Nuclear Power plant, Key Largo Volunteer Fire/Rescue became involved with Federal Nuclear Regulations and is still part of the Turkey Point exercises annually



requiring special evening classes and participation in a mock disaster drill.

During this era, the Water Emergency Team (WET) was established, and inflatable boats and trailers were purchased through donations. Members became certified as rescue divers and ongoing classes for certification in boat handling and SCUBA Search and Rescue were available. The fire department reached out to the many local dive shops in the area and recruited

experts from the dive industry to be part of WET making the team one of the most elite in the fire service.

A second set of "Jaws of Life" that came with the new Rescue Truck have proven their worth. More and more the "18 mile stretch" to the mainland has become a "Death Trap" with two sets of "Jaws" often needed at the same time. Training and evolutions in extrication were stepped up. Members of the Department have attended classes in Special Operations outside of Monroe County and have brought information and training back to the Department.

With water capacity of each truck of 1000 gallons Water Transfer truck to truck was begun. Due to the lack of hydrants, salt water was drafted from the canals and bodies of water on many occasions to help extinguish fires.

During this time, the Department grew to 30 Members. Some Key Largo Volunteer Firefighters from this era have made the Fire Service a career choice and have gone on to do well in many parts of the State of Florida.

The Fourth Ten Years: 1985 - 1995

Fire Station #1 was finally completed! Not exactly what was wanted, but adequate?




Compliance with updated training and meeting new classifications of certification prompted several senior members of the Department to become certified as Instructors.

In 1988 an 80 ft. Emergency 1 Aerial/Ladder Truck was put into service. Fire/Rescue Training had to be in compliance with more stringent State and Federal mandates.

During this era, the Department hired a Station Manager as a full time record keeper and custodian. It wasn't long before a computer was purchased and installed to enhance daily operations and record keeping.

Fire Prevention Week activities involved members of the Department at the local schools and at the Station. Public Relations, Service to the community in non-emergency situations, and public visibility had become greatly improved and continues to be emphasized today.



Smaller transistor pagers came into use to alert Department personnel. The Recruitment & Retention Program was upgraded. Some members from outside the district began to serve shifts in the station to provide better coverage.



A 3,000 gallon Tanker Truck was purchased in 1993 improving the department's fire suppression capabilities and making us less reliant on salt water for fire suppression.

A Technical Rescue Truck was acquired in 1994 to meet the needs of the rising number of serious vehicle extrication automobile accidents.



Officer Candidates were sent to classes and conferences out of the State to keep the Department up to date on the latest compliance and safety issues.

Station #1 became an official Emergency Operations Center for radiological emergencies. Phone banks were installed and communications systems upgraded.

Physical Fitness and fire fighter health and wellness were addressed and equipment for a Weight Room was purchased.

The Fifth Ten Years: 1995-2005

The Key Largo Volunteer Fire/Rescue Department has continued to evaluate needs and has effectively served a growing community by continued efforts to upgrade the capability of personnel and equipment.

2000 – The Fire Department hires Station Manager, Linda Newman

Child Safety Seat program is spearheaded by Firefighter David Bickford. Department installs and inspects child safety seats for automobiles at numerous special events and on an as needed basis.

2001 we took delivery of two Pierce Engines.

Self-contained breathing apparatus became standard and currently outfitted with the most modern technology such as heads-up-display in the face mask.



A new logo, patch and signage were implemented.

The method used for the Fund Drive was revamped and has proved to be more successful.

The Community of Key Largo commissioned the Key Largo Volunteer Fire Department's assistance along with other organizations and members of the Community to form a committee to oversee and

implement the sinking of the U.S.S. SPIEGEL GROVE in order to form the largest man-made living coral reef in the U.S. The ship was such on May 17, 2002.

The Fire Department expanded it's cadre of technical rescue divers headed by Rob Bleser, Captain of the Water Emergency Dive Rescue Team and Operations for the Department and consisting of local highly trained rescue divers from the Community.



Thanks to Federal Grants obtained by Station Manager, Linda Newman, the Station has been fully computerized. The classroom has added SMART classroom technology and state-of-the-art media to enhance teaching. State of the art tools such as thermal imaging cameras are obtained through Federal Grants.

Donations from the community allowed us to acquire a 17 ft. rigid hull Rescue Boat that greatly enhanced the Department's capability in water rescues.



A bond for construction of Fire Stations County wide was in place. With the help of past Commissioner and Mayor Murray E. Nelson funding for the new North Key Largo Station was secured. With no funds available to purchase land for the new station Chief Sergio Garcia and Station Manager Linda Newman worked with Governor Bush and struck an agreement to build the new station on State Land at a cost of one dollar a year. The fire trucks had to be temporarily relocated to the Rowels property while the

station was under



The Sixth Ten Years 2006 - PRESENT

2006 – The new KEY LARGO FIRE RESCUE & EMS DISTRICT is underway with 5 newly elected District Commissioners: Tom Tharp, Marilyn Beyer, Mark Wheaton, William Andersen, and Mike Cavagnaro. District finances are contracted out with Bishop and Rosasco and Legal Counsel is contracted with Vernis and Bowling. Vicky Fay is contracted with as the District Clerk.

New full time paid firefighter position added to the existing 2 member staff for a total of 3 full time paid employees in 2006.

The new DAVE GOW KEY LARGO FIRE STATION NUMBER 25 was completed and dedication ceremonies





FY 2007 – additional full time paid firefighter position added to existing staff of 3. Now 4 full time employees on staff – 1 Station Manager and 3 Firefighters.

A new dive rescue van was approved for purchase and delivered in fiscal year 2009.



2010 – 4 part-time paid Firefighters come on board for coverage at Station 25. Current staff exists of 4 full time paid personnel and 4 part time paid personnel.

Fireman Funds grant approved for two new Turbo Drafts for Engine 24 and Engine 25. Addition of these two pieces of equipment results in significant reduction of ISO rating in areas where waterflow to fires was an issue.

ISO study was completed in 2011 and an improvement in ISO ratings was experienced in a number of areas through the District. This has resulted in a significant lowering of insurance rates for local homeowners and in some instance has made the difference in a homeowner even being able to obtain insurance.

2012 – award made for purchase of new Squad to replace Squad 24. Delivery anticipated mid-2013.

2013 – approval this fiscal year for new fire apparatus to replace Engine 25.

Key Largo Fire Rescue Department continues to provide the highest quality of service to the residents, visitors, property owners and businesses of the Key Largo District while fostering volunteerism through creative recruitment and retention and state-of-the-art professional training programs.
